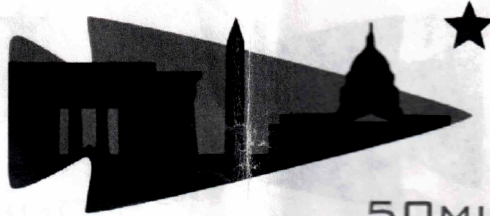

WASHINGTON DC STAR COURSE

WAYPOINTS

✓ **Georgetown Waterfront Park - 3303 Water St NW**

Part of the Georgetown Historic District, the park stretches along the banks of the Potomac River from 31st Street, NW to the Key Bridge. Take your photo on the labyrinth. **#georgetown**

✓ **C&O Canal Mile Marker 0 - 2900 Virginia Ave NW**

184 miles, 74 locks, and 11 aqueducts. This is the beginning (or end) of the iconic Chesapeake and Ohio Canal. Grab your team photo with the "Mile 0" pillar. **#MilePost0**

✓ **Franklin Delano Roosevelt Memorial - 1850 West Basin Dr SW**

"The only thing we have to fear is fear itself...." iconic words from an iconic president. Ponder FDR's contribution to America while visiting this Memorial, and don't miss Mrs. Eleanor while you're there. Include the late President and his pup in your team photo. **#FDRMemorial**

✓ **Lincoln Memorial - 2 Lincoln Memorial Cir NW**

This memorial to our 16th President is one of the more iconic sights in Washington visited by 6 million visitors annually. It served as the backdrop to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr's *I Have a Dream* speech. Stand on the steps and feature President Lincoln prominently in your team photo.

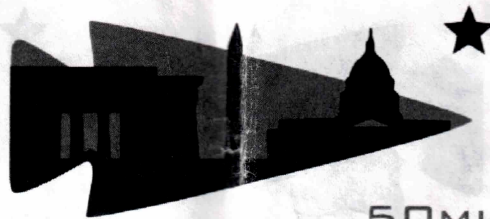
✓ **Supreme Court of the United States - 1 First St NE**

This is the Supreme Court's fourth location: First in NYC in the Merchant's Exchange Building. Secondly, inside Independence Hall in Philadelphia. Third, inside the US Capitol Building. It was moved one block east to its own building in 1935 when the current building was completed.

Take your team photo at one of the giant flagpoles at the front of the building, with the columns featuring prominently. **#SCOTUS**

✓ **The White House - 1600 Pennsylvania Ave NW**

Our first President, George Washington, selected the site for the White House in 1791. Every President since John Adams has occupied the White House, and the history of this building extends far beyond the construction of its walls. During the War of 1812, the British set fire to the President's House and it was reconstructed in 1817. Under the eye of Roosevelt and Truman, the White House underwent various expansions and updates throughout the 1900s, until it became what you see today. Grab a team photo from Pennsylvania Ave with the White House featured prominently in the photo. **#TheWhiteHouse**

Thomas Jefferson Memorial - 701 E Basin Dr NW

One of our Founding Fathers and third President of the United States, Thomas Jefferson, championed individual rights and democracy in the formative years of our country. Take your photo from inside the great dome at his memorial. **#ThomasJeffersonMemorial**

Washington Monument - 2 15th St NW

Measuring 555 feet tall, it is the tallest monument column in the world -- and was the tallest structure in the world until 1889. The cost to build it today would be \$28 million, and it took 36 years to build after several financial stalls. Take your photo at the security wall, prominently featuring the spire. **#WashingtonMonument**

Women In Military Service For America Memorial - Memorial Ave & Schley Dr, Arlington

At first glance this memorial may be confused for a gate, but it is far more than that. This memorial honors women who have served in the United States Armed Forces and stands watch at the entrance to Arlington National Cemetery. Grab your team photo here under the arch. Bonus activity: If you are a woman who has served, enter your info at the computer terminals inside the museum during business hours to register your service. **#WomensMemorial**

World War II Memorial - 1750 Independence Ave SW

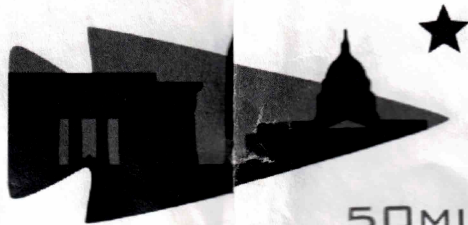
One of the newest memorials on the National Mall, this memorial honors the more than 400,000 Americans who gave their lives in World War II. Use the stars on the Freedom Wall as your backdrop as you pay your respects to this memorial. **#WW2Memorial**

Hains Point Picnic Area - 927 Ohio Dr SW

Hains Point is at the southern tip of East Potomac Park, and offers beautiful views of the Potomac River, Anacostia River, and the Washington Channel. Find the "Engineering a Landmark" plaque inside the park to learn more and to use as your team photo backdrop. Park closed from 10PM-6AM. Plan accordingly. **#HainsPoint**

The Exorcist Steps - 3520 Prospect St NW

Built in 1895, these stairs gained notoriety when featured in the film The Exorcist, causing the death of character Father Damien Karras. These steps were officially named as a DC landmark in 2015. Take your group shot at the bottom of these stairs - what an excellent day for an exorcism **#ExorcistSteps**

WASHINGTON DISTRICT STAR COURSE

Thomas Circle Park - 1 Thomas Cir NW

Thomas Circle was constructed as a traffic circle as part of the original L'Enfant Plan for the District of Columbia. The circle was named for American Civil War General George Henry Thomas. Take your photo at Thomas Circle with George Henry Thomas featured prominently in the background. **#thomascircle**

Titanic Memorial - 399 P St SW

✓ This granite statue honors the men who gave their lives so that women and children might be saved during the RMS Titanic disaster. It was unveiled May 26, 1931, by Helen Herron Taft, the widow of President Taft. **#titanicmemorial**

Lockhouse 11 - Cabin John, MD 20818

✓ Originally, the 184-mile C&O Canal project was initiated by President George Washington. By the time the canal was finished in 1850, the B&O Railroad had already reached Cumberland and the canal was nearly obsolete. These lockhouses are now a part of the National Park, and can be rented. Keeping in mind that this lockhouse may be inhabited, grab a team pic with the house in the background. **#Lockhouse11**

Swain's Lock (C&O Canal Lock 21) - 10700 Swains Lock Rd, Potomac, MD 20854

✓ This lock was built of red sandstone from Seneca, and is still visible from the C&O Towpath. The Swain family were involved in the original construction of the canal, and maintained this lock well into the 20th century through floods and bridge closures throughout the years. A nearby campsite offers toilets and potable water, so it's a good place for a pit stop. Take your team photo from the bridge with the lock house featuring prominently in the photo. **#SwainsLock**

Washington National Cathedral - 3101 Wisconsin Ave NW

✓ This cathedral broke ground in 1907 in the presence of President Theodore Roosevelt. Queen Elizabeth II and President Jimmy Carter were both present when the west rose window was dedicated in 1977. Grab your team selfie with this window featuring prominently in the photo. **#NationalCathedral**

George Washington at University Yard - 2036 H St NW

✓ Historical records have shown that the first president of the United States, President George Washington, had made indications to Congress that he aspired to have a university established in the capital of the United States. He presented numerous letters to Congress and included the subject in his last will and testament. Take your photo with George Washington's statue at this location **#universityyard**
